Description of Courses offered by the

Advanced Study in International Humanitarian Law (52760)

This course is designed for providing a general introduction to the international Humanitarian Law (IHL) and how it protects both combatants and civilians in conflicts. It includes questions and answers on the law, its application and its relationship to the ICRC. The International Humanitarian Law is a set of rules which seek, for humanitarian reasons, to limit the effects of armed conflicts. It protects persons who are not or are no longer involved in the hostilities and restricts the means and methods of warfare. The International Humanitarian Law is also known as the Law of War or the Law of Armed Conflicts.

Advanced Study in Modern Systems of Government (52740)

This course deals mainly with the creation of states and the governments that steer the work of such states. It also deals with the standing that an individual has within a state in terms of the ways available for him to attain his rights and perform his duties. The course includes a comparative study of the various systems practiced in the modern world.

Advanced Study in Cybercrims (52770)

This course examines the history of cybercrime, analyzing everything from the proliferation of obscenity on the net and the development of elaborate fraud schemes, to the creation of computer viruses and worms and the threat of domestic and international cyberterrorism. In particular, the course explores market-based (and other private) alternatives to the traditional government enforcement of the criminal law. Additionally, topics include the issues of electronic surveillance, computer hacking; computer viruses, encryption, online economic espionage; cyberterrorism, federal/state relations in the enforcement of computer crimes laws; and civil liberties online. The course aims to understand the nature of cybercrime and how it may differ from crime in realspace, to evaluate the appropriate role of governments in this area, including the privacy policy that should govern investigations of computer crimes, and to consider how to combat crimes on the internet, including how traditional notions of sovereignty and federalism that govern the criminal law in realspace ought to apply to cyberspace.

Advanced Study in Disciplinary Responsibility (52750)

Analysis of this course focuses on the elements of disciplinary responsibility and the principle of the wrongful act of a public employee. How a public employee should be penalized, the reasons for any disciplinary measure and the way that a disciplinary panel should take its decisions and implement them are discussed.

Advanced Study in Criminal Responsibility (52705)

This course is designed to give students the required knowledge about how criminal proceedings are brought about for a criminally responsible person. To do so however, students are equipped with a full understanding of the circumstances that create a criminal responsibility and the circumstances for banning it.

Advanced Study in government under Islamic Jurisprudence (52730)

This course defines government under Islamic Jurisprudence, its types pillars and conditions. Specifically, how a leader in the Islamic community ought to be elected, and then how committee of persons responsible for legal matters work and the framework of their work in order for them to be able to implement the basic standards of equality and freedom to all.

Advanced Study in Administrative Jurisdiction (52752)

This course start off by analyzing administrative jurisdiction, and the rule of law and how a legally established state should work to achieve justice. The way this course is taught depends on an analytical approach and continuous concentration on the practical side of the related theories that have evolved over the years. The rulings of the High Court of Justice are deeply analyzed on a case by case basis. The idea of competency as being the basis for any legitimate existence of any state will also deciphered. To do that however, a pre-historical preview of some administrative disputes and the rules of annulling administrative acts will be looked into and analyzed.

Advanced Study in Tax Disputes (52751)

This course is mostly related to the types of taxation schemes that a state may impose on individuals, and to the mechanisms that an individual is allowed to follow up on a dispute related to any taxation scheme from the beginning to the end of the dispute.

Advanced Study in Political Rights (52741)

The purpose of this course is to acquaint students with the scope and boundaries of the civil liberties under the Jordanian Constitution. This task is approached by analyzing the legal, political and environmental influences upon the Court in and effort to explain its decisions. The aim would be to understand the scope and limits of protection of individuals rights in Jordan and comparatively elsewhere.

Advanced Study in Legal Sociology (52780)

This course examines sociology from a legal perspective with a focus on social interaction and its effect on the way the legislative authority works to face the demanding social problems. As such,



this course explains the concept of sociology, its purposes and effects on the work of any legal system in any given society.

Advanced Study in the International Environmental Law (in English) (52761)

This course has been arranged in various and independent, but closely inter-related, units including understanding of the preliminary issues such as the definition of the term 'environment'. It then touches upon the basic legal international environmental development, as the foundation on which to assess the degree of compliance made by a specific region or a specific country

Legal Drafting (51706)

This course is a series of exercises introducing students to the way lawyers analyze and frame legal positions in litigation, conduct legal research, and present their work in writing and in oral argument. Students actively learn research and writing skills by preparing initial and final drafts of memoranda and briefs and by becoming familiar with accessing both print and electronic research materials.
